Sunday Morning Children's Liturgy of the Word

Children ages 4 through grade 3 may attend Children's Liturgy of the Word during the first portion of the 10:00 Mass on Sunday. This service is conducted by a lay adult. The Liturgy of the Word is a "child friendly" service with prayers, singing and a reading of the gospel followed by a short homily. Children will be brought into church after the Prayers of the People. The Liturgy of the Word will be conducted every Sunday that Church School classes are scheduled. The children will rejoin their parents at the Peace.

<u>Curriculum</u>

K/4 through Grade 5

PowerXpress curriculum allows the children to rotate through a series of workshops over a period of 4 weeks per unit. The children explore a single Bible story each unit through stories, science, crafts, and games.

Grades 6 through 8

Living the Good News uses Lectionary based study to emphasize:

- Christian morals and lifestyles
- Relativity to today's world
- Perseverance in prayer
- Personal commitment to Christ
- Familiarity with *The Book of Common Prayer* and the Bible

Grades 9 through 12

Faithweavers curriculum which focuses on applying God's truth to everyday life with take home topics to inspire family discussions

First Holy Communion

Children may be admitted to Communion before Confirmation with the consent of the parish priest, with the permission of the child's parents and after age-appropriate instruction in the meaning of the Eucharist. First and Second grade students will receive this instruction during the regular Sunday morning classes in the New Year. First Holy Communion will be celebrated during the Easter Vigil, March 30th.

It is expected that those children who have not yet begun to receive Holy Communion will not begin to do so until they have received instruction and are formally admitted to Holy Communion.

Youth Confirmation

According to the Prayer Book (p. 412), Confirmation is meant to be "a mature public affirmation of their faith" after due preparation. It is now generally agreed that the Sacrament of Confirmation should be administered at an older age than has been the custom in the past, with the consensus emerging throughout the Episcopal Church that "mature" means young adulthood, the 10th through 12th grade. In order to be a candidate for Confirmation, one must be baptized, active in worship, and participating in the life of the parish on a regular basis. Youth Confirmation is conducted every 2 years. The next class will be in the spring of 2014.

Baptism at St James'

Parents, godparents of candidates are required to attend a pre-baptismal orientation with the clergy. Adult candidates are required to complete appropriate instruction. Baptisms take place at the 10am Sunday Eucharist, and are reserved for the following dates: November 4th, 2012 (All Saints' Sunday), January 13th, 2013 (Baptism of the Lord), April 7th, 2013 (Easter II), May 19th, 2013 (Day of Pentecost)

Marriage at St James'

Holy Matrimony is the Sacrament by which God's grace is given to husband and wife, helping them to lead a holy life and to bring up their children in the Christian faith and life. Marriages are celebrated at any time of the year other than Advent and Lent. Sixty days notice is required. In case of a previous marriage which has ended in civil divorce, 90 days notice and permission of the bishop for remarriage is required.

Questions we are asked: Why is incense used in Church?

The use of incense in the ancient world was common, especially in religious rites. In Judaism, incense was included in the thanksgiving offerings of oil, rain, fruits, wine (cf. Numbers 7:13-17). The Lord instructed Moses to build a golden altar for the burning of incense (cf. Exodus 30:1-10), which was placed in front of the veil to the entrance of the meeting tent where the ark of the covenant was kept.



We do not know exactly when the use of incense was introduced into our Mass or other liturgical rites. At the time of the early Church, the

Jews continued to use incense in their own Temple rituals, so it would be safe to conclude that the Christians would have adapted its usage for their own rituals.

The purpose of incensing and the symbolic value of the smoke is that of purification and

sanctification. The smoke symbolizes the prayers of the faithful drifting up to heaven: the Psalmist prays, "Let my prayer come like incense before you; the lifting up of my hands, like the evening sacrifice" (Psalm 141). Incense also creates the ambiance of heaven: The Book of Revelation (8:3ff) describes the heavenly worship as follows: "Another angel came in holding a censer of gold. He took his place at the altar of incense and was given large amounts of incense to deposit on the altar of gold in front of the throne, together with the prayers of all God's holy ones. From the angel's hand, the smoke of the incense went up before God, and with it the prayers of God's people."

The usage of incense adds a sense of solemnity and mystery to the Mass. The visual imagery of the smoke and the smell remind us of the transcendence of the Mass which links heaven with earth, and allow us to enter into the presence of God. \Box
