From the Rector

Dear Parishioners & Friends of St James' Church,

Let me begin by thanking you for the excellent participation in the various liturgies of Holy Week. The liturgies of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday had the biggest crowds in a number of years, and the congregation at the Easter Vigil surpassed my wildest expectations with 328 in attendance! Quite literally it was standing room only. It often seems as if the various services just "happen," but I assure you that much work goes on behind the scenes so that everything comes off without a hitch.

Our thanks are especially due to Ruth Anderson, the choir, altar guild, and those who ministered at the altar for all of the Holy Week and Easter liturgies.

We continue to celebrate our Lord's Resurrection throughout the whole of Eastertide, rounding out on Whitsunday, the Day of Pentecost. Towards the end of Eastertide, at 2pm on Saturday, May 22nd the Bishop of Dallas will be here for my Installation as Rector, and—more importantly—for the dedication of the new Parish Activity Center. I'm sure you will want to be here for these events and for the champagne reception that will follow. This would be an excellent opportunity for you to invite unchurched friends and family to worship with us, or to pick up the phone and "welcome home" those who have fallen away from the St James' family in recent

years. Why not tell them, "St James' is back, and we'd love to have you back, too!"

And although it might seem a little premature, the parish leadership has already begun to think about the Fall program. The Vestry will be on Retreat May 7th and 8th. We will spend that time evaluating the current mission and ministry of the parish, and then setting goals for future ministry development. Please feel free to express your thoughts to me or any of the members of Vestry prior to our retreat—we are your servants.

One of the key areas that has already been identified is the parish's program of Christian Education—for children, teenagers and adults. Already a questionnaire has been sent to households with Sunday School / EYC aged students for their vital feedback.

Needless to say, the whole of our ministry as a parish depends on having the necessary resources at our disposal: Financial resources certainly, but also the time and talent of our members. As the Prayer Book clearly reminds us, "The ministers of the Church are lay persons, bishops, priests and deacons" (BCP, p. 855). You'll here more about this later in the month of May.

In the meantime, continue to let Christ Easter in you. The Resurrection is so wonderful, that it takes fifty days to celebrate it!

Why Choose the Episcopal Church?

One of the great triumphs of capitalism of course is the multiplication of choices for the consumer. If you have ever traveled abroad you cannot help but notice that while most of the world's population must content itself with three kinds of ketchup we in America can choose from thirty. That kind of choice can be a wonderful thing. But that kind of choice can have a deleterious effect as well -- especially if it creates a culture in which people thing they have a right to a multiplicity of options, and that this right applies to every arena of human existence.

Modern American culture has certainly made a supermarket out of religions. There are more "brands" of religion in our country than in any other country on the planet, and all with sometimes subtle and sometimes outlandish distinctions between them. Spirituality has literally become a designer enterprise with every conceivable preference and permutation made available to the potential proselyte. I even read recently of a "church" in San Francisco dedicated to promulgating the "gospel" of jazz great John Coltrane.

But it does no good for us to wrinkle our noses in disdain at this phenomenon and pretend that our church still has a preferential cultural claim on the vast majority of unchurched Americans. It doesn't. We must now compete with other spiritualities and other churches to get a hearing with people as to why we thing we have something unique to offer them. We mustn't change who we are -- that's not my meaning. But we must clear out throats and invite people to our church, and with the inviting, provide them with compelling reasons to, as Philip said to Nathanael, "come and see" (John 1:46).

The Episcopal Church is an historic church, with roots going back to the time of the Apostles. While it is true that novelty is

interesting, it is also undeniable that things that have stood the test of time endure because of their quality.

The Episcopal Church is a catholic church that holds fast to, and proclaims, what Christians in all times and is all places have believed. The Greek word katholikos, from which we derive our English word "catholic," has two distinct but related meanings: The first is "universal," and the second is "that which belongs to the whole." The content of the faith we declare to be true is not simply the pious opinions of a select minority on the "Sceptered Isle," but what Christians everywhere and for all time have accepted as true. Our church is not the church in toto, but a part of the whole.

One gets more Bible on Sunday morning in an Episcopal Church than in any other church in the nation!

The Episcopal Church is a reformed church that emphasizes the authority of Hole Scripture and the truth that we are made right with God through faith in Jesus Christ alone. Antiquity does not equal verity. The 16th century Protestant reformers purged the medieval church of centuries of man-made accretions that obscured the grace of God and restored it to a simple gospel based upon the Word of God. The motto of their work was "Post tenebras lux" -- "After the darkness, light."

The Episcopal Church is a biblical church that proclaims and strives to live by the unchanging truths of God's Holy Word. One gets more Bible on Sunday morning in an Episcopal Church -- in the prayers, the liturgy, the readings, and the sermon -- than in any other church in the nation. It is only the Word of God that possesses the power to

change the human heart and alter destinies; consequently, saints and sinners alike ought to get as much of God's Word and as little of man's ever-mutating opinions as is possible.

The Episcopal Church is a liturgical church that worships with the biblical and time-honored Book of Common Prayer. The prayer book saves us from the tyranny of man-centered worship, and the tyranny of becoming the "church of what's happenin' now," and frees us and teaches us how to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness.

The Episcopal Church is a welcoming church, which invites all kinds of people from all walks of life to come and meet the Lord Jesus Christ

There it is. Frankly, I think we are the only show in town. Statistics indicate that three-quarters of visitors to any church are there because they've been invited by someone. Won't you invite someone to "come and see?"

What the Episcopal Church Expects of Her Members

- 1. They will worship God in church every Sunday and every Holy Day unless prevented by serious Illness or other grave cause. (Title II, Canon I.)
- 2. They will observe principal feasts and fasts of the church calendar. (BCP, pp. 15, 17.)
- 3. They will say their prayers daily and grace at meals. (BCP, pp. 37-60.)
- 4. They will take an active part in the ministry and mission of their local parish and give to the work of the church through their parish. (BCP, p. 856.)
- 5. They will have their children baptized and instruct them in the teachings of the church, exposing them to the Christian life in the family and in the parish. (BCP, pp. 301-302, 304-305.)
- 6. They will see their marriage as a sacrament of Christ's love (BCP, p. 423ff.) and they will work for its health - seeking counsel from a priest when marital union is imperiled. (Title I, Canon 18.1)
- 7. They will own and use a copy of The Book of Common Prayer.
- 8. They will request a letter of Transfer when they move to another parish (register to serve where they live).
- 9. They will make wills providing for their final good stewardship for family, church, and charitable concerns. (BCP, p. 445.)
- 10. They will strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being. (BCP, p. 305.)
